## Friars' Briar - The Portage Connection 1990

On the recommendation of the directors present at the '89 Briar in Saskatoon, the decision was made to associate with the Uniroyal-Goodrich Junior Curling Championships to be held in Portage la Prairie in March 1990. This proved to be a very good decision. The quality of curling was excellent. The arrangements for folklorama type food and entertainment in the lovely Westwood Village complex all turned out to be very exciting.

Because of limited accommodations for such a large event in Portage, the Friars were housed at the Relax Plaza in Winnipeg and curled in the Memorial Assiniboine Rink. Following the morning curling, they were transported by van or car, courtesy of the Winnipeg A.O.T.S., to Portage la Prairie for the afternoon and evening games and associated events.

Registration for the Friars' Briar took place in the Hospitality Room of the Relax Plaza. Coffee and T.V. viewing was available there to watch the Junior Curling for those who chose not to buy tickets. The proximity of the hotel to the newly built North Portage Development was definitely a plus for curlers and spouses. It contained stores, restaurants, theatres and covered walkways leading to the library and other cultural and recreational offerings of downtown Winnipeg. Many visited the new Imax Theatre and Museum of Man and Nature, or took in one of the performances in the new theatre.

A total of fourteen rinks participated in all; one from B.C., three from Alberta, two from Saskatchewan, six from Manitoba and two from Ontario. The gold medallions went to Alberta. That rink skipped be Guy Scholz included his father Herb, father-in-law Don Anderson and Lloyd Peters. Silver and Bronze went to Manitoba. Silver went to Ken Innes, wife Carole, Stewart Folster and Art Flath. Bronze went to Fraser Muldrew, brother Milt, Roger Call and Bert Foliot. Grant Smith's rink, also from Manitoba, took fourth place. Curling with him was his wife Enid, Peter Douglas and Ewing Rae. Travel grants or tickets for viewing the Junior World Curling were available to out-of-province curlers.

The Awards Banquet and annual meeting of the Friars'Briar Association was held in the lower social hall of the Portage Presbyterian Church. A good musical program had been arranged. In an informal vote taken, the indication for the future, was that more members came for the clergy curling than for the spectator aspect. Several younger family men were finding the financing difficult.

An invitation was extended from Hamilton and district to hold next year's Friars' Briar there in connection with the Labatt Tankard Canadian Men's Championships. There is every indication that the Eastern Provinces will be well represented.
